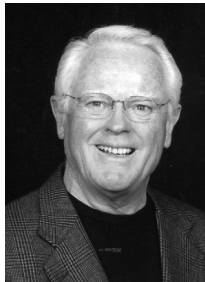

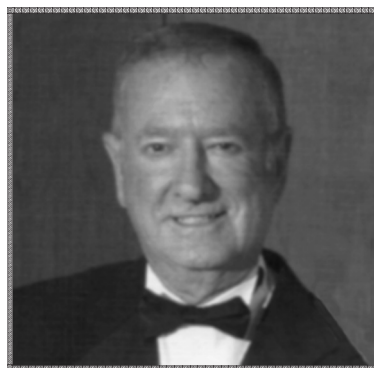

David Idol, after retiring as Senior Purchasing Agent after 33 years with R.J. Reynolds, David signed on with Youth with a Mission and thus began another life. Following six months training aboard the *MSS Anastasis*, he served as a missionary in Poland (Gdansk), Ukraine (Yalta), Russia, Estonia (Tallinn), and Latvia (Riga) before coming home on sabbatical.

He returned to the mission field in China as an ESL teacher (English as a Second Language) since China does not permit missionaries. He taught college-level English in Chun Chung, then moved to Inner Mongolia before returning to Winston-Salem for the birth of his first grandchild. He later taught in Lima, Peru, and in Argentina.

Meanwhile, Dave became a competitive Dance Skater, winning three North Carolina titles in the Esquire Division before becoming involved in ballroom dancing in the '90s. "I was surprised to find both sports were so similar," he says," but finding greater fulfillment on the dance floor, he forthwith eschewed the skating rink for the ballroom.

"I truly enjoy competition," he says and has competed successfully in USA Dance competitions as well as Fred Astaire-sponsored events. When not on the dance floor, he can usually be found engaged in some form of landscaping and gardening at his home in Kernersville. When the weather grows cold, he retreats to his studio where he paints using watercolors as well as oils.

However, his greatest pleasure is spending time with his two grandsons, Matthew and Jacob. "When they are grown, I hope to return to the mission field," Dave says...perhaps with them.
